Sir Trevor visited our school on 13th of November to speak to a number of students, who have worked with the literacy charity, Beanstalk.

We knew that Sir Trevor rarely gives interviews, so it is an honour that he accepted our invitation to do an interview with us.

Along with his brothers, Mark and David, Sir Trevor established The Pears Foundation in 1992. Their aim was to support organisations and projects working on key issues affecting the wellbeing of people in the UK and globally.

Sir Trevor told us that he has been visiting Bradford for 20 years to encourage and support diversity. He was also visiting our school because he works closely

with The Coram Foundation, who are based in London, but who have recently amalgamated with Beanstalk. Both Beanstalk and Coram work with young people to improve reading and literacy.

Sir Trevor believes that "Reading is important as it encourages understanding and wellbeing. Also it is helpful to be able to read as it is a fundamental skill and overall is fun". This emphasises how important DEAR is for all of us, as reading is the key to help us achieve our top jobs.

Sir Trevor's favourite book is 'Peter Pan' as he commented how "It shares new things as you get older." However, at the moment he is reading a book called 'Mountains Beyond Mountains' about Dr Paul Farmer who changed his career to help create a

hospital in Haiti.

This is strongly connected with the principles of the Pears Foundation, as Sir Trevor's foundation reaches out to help others just like the Doctor in the book.

Sir Trevor wants to expand his links with other charities so he can have an active role in society. He has also partnered and funded a project called National Young People's Forest. This project is going to involve the planting of 250,000 trees by young people.

Sir Trevor believes that "Social action is important" and that 10 to 20 year olds will be able to volunteer to take part in the planting, so creating an influential step to help the eco-system, as well as helping society for the greater good.

Playing drums isn't her only interest though, as she has been actively involved in singing for the past year. "I was encouraged to try it out and I realised I quite enjoyed it."



From now onwards, Maths homework is due in on Monday and Science now Wednesday.


Miss Akudi, Head of Year 9, told us, "The school always responds to students' feedback and this will hopefully help those who are struggling on Hegarty Maths.



Year 11 began the year hearing from some of our alumni. In particular they were spoken to by


